I just want to share what I see and feel.

In my car as I wait for the return of Godfrey and Lazaro, is Mattias Joseph. In his lap is a one-year-old boy, named Bryson. He has on blue jeans, a brown sweater with yellow stripes on each arm. On his head is a yellow wool stocking cap. He is cold. Yet it is so hot, I say, "Joto sana." (Very hot) I drive very slowly over rocky dirt.

The car, a 1993 Mitsubishi Pajera, covered in dust with two door handles broken, slowly parts people and bicycles and carts, loaded with oranges, mangoes, and pineapples.

I Want You To See--Continued from page 1....

We just passed a lady, dressed in orange, draped with red. Seven young men stand in the middle of the road on a cement triangle at an intersection, and they are just one group of fifteen such groups I have seen this morning. They are men with nothing to do. There is 75% unemployment in Tanzania. In my backseat is Godfry, who will leave home and go to Form 4 (equivalent of the 9th grade) in Iringa next year. He is 19. Beside him rides Lazar0 (16) who will begin Augustine Perfect Secondary School in January, if his parents (about 3 hours away) will sponsor him. We stop as Godfry and Lazaro disappear into a village. I am enjoying seeing it, but I can not describe the rusted metal and dirt of the huts they go between. Two dirty little babies about five wave and shout, "Habari, Muzungu." (Hello, white person.) Four girl dressed in navy blue school uniforms, pass with pink or black backpacks. They glance at me as they pass and nod greetings. I do not understand the Swahili they speak to each other. An old man with a gray beard leans on a long pole and stares at me from across the street. I wonder, "When did any of these people last eat? They all look so sad." Matthias and Bryson also leave me.

I go alone to a petrol station, Njake, where I am to meet a national preacher friend. I call him on my cell phone, "Where are you?" He hangs up without saying a word, but I see him running toward me. He wants to know if I know about the cocoa that grows in Kyela and how cocoa workers get help for school fees for their children from the cocoa company. Then I learn the real reason for my being there. Two other preachers approach. One hugs me. He is Pastor Hosea of Shalom Christian Center, a Pentecostal fellowship. I have preached in his church twice and have led a Christian Family Conference. "My people still love you," he says, "and this is Pastor Jeremiah from Kisongo. He is the pastor of Deliverance Church, a Maasai church. Standing before me is a very dark Maasai. His left ear lobe is hanging limp to his shoulder; the right ear lobe is looped over his ear. Hosea continues, "When will you come to Shalom again?"

I go to the car to get my calendar. I discover three dates are filled. St. Andrews Anglican: November 22, 2009. A USA team: December 29 - January 8, 2010. A conference on Humility, Salvation and Faith at Ngorogoro: January 16 - 21, 2010. "Why don't you preach at Shalom November 29 and Pastor Jeremiah would like you to preach at Deliverance: how about the first Sunday in December? You have those dates open on your calendar."

Then in Maasai Pastor Jeremiah is speaking, "And can you lead a Christian Growth Conference for a week at my church? "Quickly I say three days, and he asks me if I will come December 3 - 6, preaching on the 6th. He will guarantee me 300 people will attend. Hosea says, "I will go, too, and translate. I am Maasai." David, my Swahili translator, says, "I will go and if you need anything spoken in Swahili, I will be there." To teach. Top reach. That is why I am here. And I will not be paid. No money will exchange hands.

I only get their respect and bright smiles. They leave. Before I get home, my cell phone rings. "Do you have a passport picture? They want to make posters of you to advertise the event and to excite the members that you are coming?" I go to a downtown photo shop and 4 passport pictures are taken for 5,000.00 (less than \$5.00).

I take the picture to David and Jacinta's new home, and sit with the mas they watch Looney Tunes cartoons in English. The conversation is like that of a small child. Tell me all about buses and trains that run on electricity. The Metro commuter trains in the USA come to my mind, and when I describe their going underground, these two educated Tanzanians are amazed. The conversation ends when David says, "One day I will go to the United States and see this modern technology." A grown man, sitting before me, has the childlike amazement about what to him is miraculous, but to me it is nothing special. USA friends do not see or understand what I have seen and heard.

Meeting the leaders of the New Canaan land Community Church, and the prospect of their sending a team our way; a newly married couple coming to Arusha, Mark a physical therapist and his wife, Maria, who sings so beautifully. They come the latter part of February, 2010. Space does not allow me opportunity to elaborate on what they plan to do. A social worker and her husband plan to come to Tanzania in May, 2010.

I wish you could see, could feel, could be there. Yes, it is good for myself-esteem, but it is indescribable. I just ask my USA friends to pray for me and Barbara. I ask my USA friends to give to support Called to Serve. I cannot get you to see what I see or to feel what I feel. I just ask God to bless you as you pray and as you give. I want you to see the Tanzania as I see him/her and give and pray, even if you see them differently that I do.

We had a photographer visit and travel all over Tanzania last week. He took 3,500 pictures in seven days. He had the photographer's eye, and often he said, "Everywhere I turn there is a picture." He is putting together note cards with some of his pictures to be sold this Christmas. He has designed a Prayer Calendar with his pictures to sell to support Called to Serve's ministries.

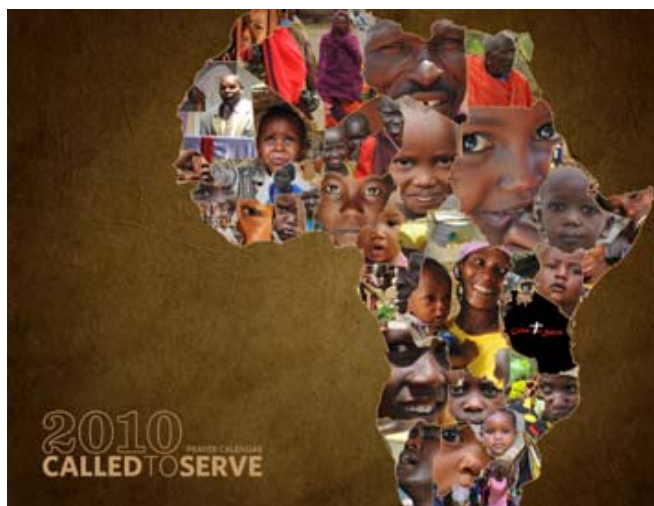
Called-to-Serve is very excited about this project.

WATER2WINE PROJECT

When we were in Nyumba ya Mungu when a young man named Alfred traveled with us and helped us in Kariat and Spillway.

When we were there - there were 6 people in the hospital with cholera. Two days later Alfred came to Arusha and called us to say that now 15 people are in the hospital and one child has died. All from cholera. All from the water.

Please pray for these people and for those of us who are looking for a way to help them.

800 Children

Going through an area called Kijenje, I saw a sign Bethel Christian Center. I picked up Matthias to help him get a cell phone. I asked him about the center. I wanted to meet the pastor, because that is how I learn of new opportunities of ministry. I walked through the gate to Bethel Christian Center, and I re-met Golden, the Program Director of Shalom Center, a home for street children.

We went into the office and in five minutes the senior pastor, Oral, called me. I sat in his office and learned that 800 children attend that facility every Sunday at 2:00 P.M. I will go back next week with the invitation to meet and one day teach his staff of 8. Pastor Gilbert is the children's pastor. Future teams will entertain those children. The government has approved land and the building of a dispensary.

The area is predominantly Muslim. Called to Serve now has an inroad to ministry there.

KISONGO MAASAI

A passport picture has been taken and given to Pastor Jeremiah, and a conference on Christian Growth was taught at Deliverance Maasai Church, December 3 - 6.

CHRISTMAS AT OUR HOUSE.

As we get email after email about how many inches of snow there are in Virginia.... 8 inches, 12 inches, 14 inches.....!?! I have a strange thing going on in my mind. I read about your snow and I close my eyes and picture what I think this Christmas must look like for you all. Beautiful! Then - I open my eyes and realize that it is also Christmas here. Only here it is brown. Dusty and brown. Some of the nights recently have brought us heavy rains - so on the dry, dust crusted roads there are occasional mud puddles. Big, wide pools full of dirty water. They seem to just sit there and the intense sun does not change or reduce them. Dusty and muddy at the same time! No snow. Even Mt. Meru will not have snow until March. Kilimanjaro, as they say here, is "hiding her face in shame" (no one knows why she is ashamed???) so we cannot see her snow. All of this, yet it is still Christmas.

From the CD player comes "I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas". That's not going to happen! This year we have a team coming right after Christmas Day. They will be here for New Year's Eve and also for Epiphany.....I know, what? Epiphany? Isn't that what the Catholic Church does? not Baptists !!!! Oh, but Elton and I have always celebrated the birth of the Christ right through January 6th. It is beautiful and symbolic.....it is, perhaps, also a way to stretch out the season we love so much. Anyway, since the team will be here during some of the holiday and most of the twelve days of Christmas we decided to open the cardboard boxes that came with us when we shipped everything here three and a half years ago and do a little decorating. It is nice to see reminders tucked here and there in different rooms that tell us over and over....it's Christmas, it's Christmas! Don't worry about the cyclone of dust that sweeps through and over everything everyday - just enjoy, just worship, just remember - it is Christmas and Christ is here, too. You don't need snow - it is still Christmas!

Sometimes you guys ask us - what is Christmas like there? Well, three years ago there was nothing anywhere. No lights, even on the shops and stores, no Christmas trees, nothing. Each year since - this is our fourth Christmas here - we notice more signs of the season. Usually, no one puts up trees - there are no pine trees, or my personal favorite, - Frazier fir trees. Oh! I do miss that smell - that fragrance - THAT is Christmas! But, not here. No trees. Normally, on Christmas Eve (can't do this any earlier, it would dry up immediately!) the men who pull wooden carts that take things from here to there around town have their carts filled with cut green branches - a kind of cedar looking branch about four feet long.

They sell these on Christmas Eve for about fifty cents and they are taken home, put in a bucket of dirt and decorated with pieces of paper or, if you can afford it, bright strips of colored tinsel. It will stay up for Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

Boxing Day is the day after and it is the day that gifts are exchanged. This year on the streets in town men have been walking around with small (also about 4 feet) artificial trees to sell. We have seen some artificial trees stacked up in front of one grocery - like we stack the real trees! Looks funny! The trees are too expensive - but somebody buys them! The shops and supermarkets (don't let the word fool you, they are tiny) are running out of everyday things - now we will have to wait until more shipping crates come into Arusha to re-supply places. When something is out of stock - they say "it is finished". Paper towels are finished, candy is finished, petrol is finished, coke light is finished!!! A few larger stores have hung those strings of colored lights that look like water hoses with lights inside. Inside a few places - restaurants, hotels, etc. are interesting versions of trees. Not much though. And no pretty candles lit in every window. And no "tacky light tours"! And no reason to take a ride to see the lights - nope. In fact, most days even the electricity is Finished!

During the first couple of Christmas' we unpacked and gave away trees and ornaments and toys. Seven. Now it is kind of nice to go into places like Samaritan Village Orphanage each year and say "hello" to old tree friends and see the children enjoying them. That is Christmas.

On Christmas Day we will go to St. Andrews Anglican Church - our friend Peter Undole is pastor there. Elton has been asked to preach and we will worship on Christmas morning there. Last year there were no carols sung, no Christmas music - just worship as always. Elton and I get a few tiny presents to exchange on Christmas morning before we go to church. You can buy small rolled up pieces of wrapping paper for twenty cents each. Barely enough to cover a box - we brought some flat boxes back with us from the States this time. But the paper adds a little color and cheers up the dust for Christmas. There is not much here to purchase - you have to have things made by hand or just have fun with little open-ups. Not much - just enough to follow that tradition and to say "I remember" "I love you". "Merry Christmas!"

Your regular giving will allow them to spend more time in the field proclaiming the message of God's love and forgiveness and less time in the states raising funds.

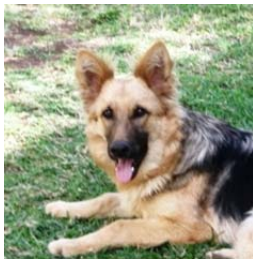
From Our Home to Yours.

Some of you have asked us for some pictures from our house, we have info on the site in the "CTS at home.", but thought you might like to see some of them here.



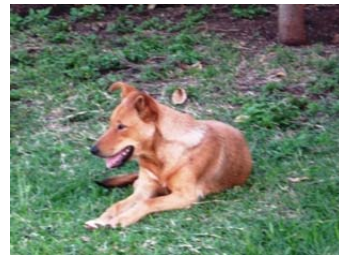
Sukari - means "sugar" - because of all of the white. She is sleeping with a toy cat we almost threw out until she adopted it!
